Marsanne is a white grape variety native to the Hermitage region (Côtes du Rhône) where it is called Marsanne blanche. In Valais (Switzerland), Marsanne is called Ermitage. It is also well established in Cassis and in Savoie. Today, it is Australia which has made it its spearhead with 80 % of the world's grape varieties.	Roussanne is a white grape variety with white juice from the Rhone valley and the south of France. It is used in particular in the grape varieties of Hermitage and Châteauneuf-du-Pape whites. In Savoie, Roussanne is called Bergeron. The wine made from this grape variety is the AOC Chignin-Bergeron.	In France, it is the unique grape variety of the AOC Condrieu. After almost disappearing, it has become one of the most appreciated varieties worldwide since the last quarter of the 20th century. The origin of the grape variety is obscure but is linked to the region where it was originally grown and comes from wild vines in the Rhône region.	White Grenache (just like Grey Grenache) is a variety of Grenache. The grape variety is mainly grown throughout the Mediterranean region. It is part of the white wine grape varieties of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, Lirac, Coteaux-Varois, Rasteau, Banyuls, Maury and Rivesaltes.
